# Please Stop Yelling by Dawn Griffith PSA Merit Award Winner – Nature



Several months ago, I discovered a nest of Burrowing Owls and decided to revisit it to check if the owlets had been born and if they were out exploring their surroundings. On a windy weekday, I found myself alone at the nesting site, with no one else around. The serene atmosphere was accompanied by the sight of several owls lingering near the nest and flying around in the breeze.

With my camera ready, I managed to capture approximately 50 shots of these captivating birds. Among them, a handful stood out as my favorites, including the one featured on the cover page. The Burrowing Owls are remarkable creatures, full of expression and engaging in playful movements, making it

relatively easy to snap something delightful and thrilling. While my original goal was not to achieve this specific shot, the experience of being alone, just at the right distance for the owls to feel secure, was immensely rewarding.

However, the popularity of this nesting site has grown, and I've recently observed as many as 10 people gathered around it at once. This influx of visitors has raised concerns about the potential disruption to the owls' natural behaviors. As wildlife photography continues to captivate many enthusiasts, it is crucial for us to approach it with a sense of responsibility and respect for the creatures we are photographing. By being mindful not to invade their space and ensuring our presence does not interfere with their living conditions, we can help preserve the delicate balance of nature.

The burrowing owls, with their expressive faces and quirky actions, make for fascinating subjects in wildlife photography. Their ability to convey a range of emotions and behaviors adds depth and charm to each shot. This particular capture, with the owl's keen gaze and the backdrop of the windy day, holds a special place in my collection. It serves as a reminder of the importance of patience and respect for wildlife photography.

# Member Profile – Javed Shakoor



Javed is a quiet, under-the-radar kind of guy who can be found at most club field trips, so we thought it would be nice to learn a bit more about him. His profile has been lightly edited for length and clarity.

I am a retired professional accountant who spent most of my life in Karachi, Pakistan. After attending university there, I spent eight years in the United Kingdom – four years working as an articled clerk while studying for the Institute of Chartered Accountants membership, and the next four years as a manager at a London-based accounting firm. Besides work assignments in Saudi Arabia (8 years) and Bangladesh (3 years), I spent the rest of my career in Karachi.

Photography has been an interest of mine since childhood, even though accountancy is not a field that typically inspires creative

pursuits. I remember attending flower shows when very young and being amazed by the glorious colors and harmonious designs. Landscapes have always fascinated me, especially mountainous areas. At first I used my father's old Voigtlander camera, which had a folding bellows. While in England, I purchased a Yashica fixed-lens camera and quickly realized how challenging it was to capture the awe-inspiring beauty I saw with my eyes onto film. Since then, I've been hooked trying to get that elusive quality seen in the works of great photographers.

After graduation, my father gave me a Canon SLR, and later, while in Saudi Arabia, I bought a Nikon F3. I've been a Nikon user ever since, gradually upgrading to digital cameras, starting with a Nikon D200. Now, I've transitioned to mirrorless cameras and currently use a Nikon Z8, which I'm extremely happy with. I still use my older DSLR lenses with an F2Z adapter but am gradually upgrading to Z lenses. Currently, I own three: the Z 14-24/2.8 for landscapes, the Z 180-600/5.6-6.3 for wildlife photography, and the Z 24-120/4.0, which stays on the camera for general photography. My next purchase will likely be the Z 105/2.8 macro lens to replace my old AFS version, as I find the new Z lenses lighter and optically superior, thanks to the larger Z mount.

I mostly focus on landscapes and macro photography, particularly close-ups of flowers. Since joining the Wasatch Camera Club, I've also developed an interest in wildlife photography, especially birds in flight. The Nikon Z8, combined with my new 180-600 lens, has opened up the exciting world of bird photography, and I look forward to improving my skills. Recently, the club's astrophotography outings have also got me excited in exploring that fascinating area of photography.

After emigrating to the US in 2016, my family lived in Florida for three years before moving to Salt Lake City in 2020 to be closer to my two children. Encouraged by my son, I joined the Wasatch Camera Club almost three years ago and have thoroughly enjoyed participating in club outings and activities. Membership has also allowed me to meet wonderful people and make new friends.

We are photographers. We are proficient in our craft and we take it seriously. Our images tell our stories. But we find ourselves in a new world where we're grouped among would-be influencers, pocket-phone-paparazzo and Al sludge and everyone's feeding a hungry algorithm that never gets full. Our meticulous work becomes content; megapixel McNuggets for the masses to scroll, judge, and forget. In a word: consume.



This remains the most competitive division in the Interclub Competition, and we faced challenges this round. Judged by the Great New Braunfels Photography Club in Texas, our scores ranged from 8 to 11 out of 15. We dropped from 18th to 22nd place out of 24 clubs and did not receive any awards.

#### **PID-Monochrome Division**

Our group was judged by Synergy (UK), which appeared to be more generous in scoring. Our scores ranged from 9 to 14, moving us up from 8th to 6th place out of 18 clubs.

#### Patience and Persistence Pay Off by Jeff Clay, Board Chair

On the last full day of our recent winter Iceland tour I awoke to a major white-out of a snowstorm. We were in one of my favorite areas of the country, the Snæfellsnes Peninsula, which has some of the most beautiful and iconic sights on that most beautiful and iconic island. It didn't look good for driving. much less sightseeing and photography. Nonetheless, we checked out and hit the road with our intrepid local guide and driver, Sigurður. He tried hard to find us things to see and photograph but at times the visibility could be measured in tens of feet. After a couple hours of this we arrived at the incredibly photogenic (and oft-photographed) waterfall of Kirkjufellsfossar with the pyramidal mountain of Kirkjufell beyond. But we couldn't see the

mountain hiding beneath a white cloak of driving snow, white mist, and low clouds. I was skeptical that any interesting photograph could be had but we gave it a-go.

From the parking lot I trudged through the snow with my camera in my coat and made my way to the waterfall. It really is a set of three main falls emptying into a river that gracefully curves around an outcropping. On clear days the mountain looms impressively in the background. I was first here seven years ago on a cloudy summer day. I waited for about 15 minutes and finally got a bit of sun on the mountain, as seen here. This time in the whipping snow, the shape of the mountain was only hinted at. i thought at the least I would descend to the end of the path and photograph the falls and call it good. Slipping and sliding my way down the path i got to the end and proceeded to shoot bursts of images, with the plan to blend them in post-processing to create the nice blurred effect of falling, flowing water. There was no way I was going to fiddle with a tripod in those conditions. After a minute or two of that I started climbing up the path until I got to approximately where I set up my tripod 7 years before, and lo! The lovely shape of Kirkjufell began appearing out of the gauzy whiteness. The snow was still falling, though not as intensely. After waiting another minute I began shooting hand-held vertical bursts with the intent of creating a panorama. I quickly shot five frames comprised of 10-15 exposure bursts and thought: not ideal, but I think this will work!

Later, in Reykjavík hotel before flying home the next day, I processed the image. Each frame comprised of multiple exposures I stacked, aligned and blended in Photoshop to achieve the water-blurred look I was looking for. Then the five resulting images were photo merged as a panorama in Lightroom. That large image I then brought back into Photoshop for cleanup, to add contrast, and to sharpen. The image above, I think, attests to the values of persistence and patience in photography!



# Presentations & Workshops – Recap

# January 14 – Creative Cell Phone Photography with Nancy Ori from the PSA Speakers Bureau (Zoom)

On January 14, Nancy Ori, leader of the New Jersey Media Center and a professional photographer for 50 years, gave a video talk on Creative Cellphone Photography as part of the PSA Speakers Bureau.

Smartphones offer several advantages, including their small size, accessibility, and ability to blend in more naturally with crowds compared to a DSLR. Recent technological advancements have begun to narrow the gap in image quality between smartphones and dedicated cameras. However, creating a strong image still requires you to "think it through." Nancy discussed key artistic principles, such as the rule of thirds, controlling exposure, and utilizing complementary colors, diagonal lines, and contrast effectively.

She also demonstrated useful accessories, such as a bracket grip, to improve stability. Nancy advised starting with the phone's native editing tools, then exploring additional software apps that can enhance images with textures and painterly effects, helping to convey mood and emotion. Several beautiful examples were shown during the presentation, including some creative mixed media works derived from a cell phone photograph.

Before After

Photo editing is an important part of getting the most from an image. A good image does not just happen after you push the shutter button. Learn how to maximize the image and speed up image processing. Editing software can turn a blah image into a compelling story.

There will be four presenters in four sessions of 15 minutes each. The subjects and presenters are:

- Claudia O'Grady: walk through general workflow of a landscape image, starting with merging different exposure values to capture full dynamic range. The workflow will demonstrate processes and differences in global edits versus localized adjustments, touching on most of the slider functionality.
- **Jason Cameron:** review color theory using Adobe color, then demonstrate the color grading and color mixing panels in Camera Raw and selective color tools in Photoshop.
- **Greg Smith:** demonstrate regular and adaptive preset options available in Lightroom, and the larger number of options available when using RAW files. Converting an image to black and white and tone processing, with or without presets, will also be shown.
- **Jeff Clay:** demonstrate several ways to process Milky Way night scape images using Lightroom, Photoshop and a couple of other pieces of software to create stunning images.


